Our Chinese Resident Participation is Growing...

A Connection perspective shared from our Chinese translator, Jack Chen

Many Chinese residents in Sir Walter came to US as immigrants when they are old. They usually stay in their room pretty much time and have very limited social life outside their rooms and perhaps kind of lonely. The situation changes after PostScript OutReach came to Sir Walter two years ago to start Thursday's night event- "The Connection." These Chinese people started gettng out of their room to enjoy the food, the friendship with the neighbor and the volunteers during the event. The language barrier seems also to disappear quietly due to their open hearts and the help from English/Mandarin translation volunteers. Cultural differences during the meeting seem not existing either. The number of local Chinese attendance is over 15 now, which accounts for about 75% of Chinese residents here, jumping from a few two years ago. The number matters, but the two hours of quality time they have matters more. You can always see the smiles on their faces during their



stay enjoying dinner, art activity, raffles, games and an important part - sharing. When the event ends, they say to each other with smiles again "see you next week." "The Connection" event weekly definitely helps improve their Spiritual life.
